



EL MONTE POLICE SHOOTING

El Monte police receive prayers and emotional support

After two El Monte police officers were fatally shot Tuesday during a confrontation with a suspect, their colleagues soon received support and comfort from local clergy.

Three members of the police department's Chaplaincy Corps arrived at the police station on Valley Boulevard that night.

At the time, the officers had been reported as wounded, according to George Ussery, who was one of the three pastors. Ussery has been a member of the Chaplaincy Corps for 25 years.

"We gathered with employees at the station to talk and pray together," he said.

Cpl. Michael Paredes and Officer Joseph Santana later died at Los Angeles County USC Medical Center. Ussery said he went with offi-

cers as the bodies were escorted from the hospital to the coroner's office.

Manny Coronilla, pastor of Calvary Chapel El Monte and a member of the Chaplaincy Corps for about 15 years, said he received a text message Tuesday from the officer who is the coordinator of the corps. He contacted all the chaplains. He and two others were able to make it to the station that night.

But even if they didn't receive a text, he said they would have responded.

Coronilla, who also went to the station Wednesday, plans to attend the candlelight vigil at 7 p.m. today at the front steps of the Civic Center.

"The chaplains offer spiritual support. It's basically us making ourselves available to any officers that need prayer or maybe they just need to talk to anybody," Coronilla said. "It's been

tough on everybody."

Local clergy are not the only ones offering support to officers.

Chaplains from different cities also have been to the station as well, according to Lt. Pete Rasic.

"I have peer support and trauma (support) from all over the San Gabriel Valley," he said.

Other police agencies under mutual aid are patrolling the city. Different agencies have come in offering food, moral support and therapy dogs, Alma K Martinez, El Monte City manager, said.

The city has grief counselors on-site for officers, for families of the two officers and city employees, she said. While City Hall offices will be closed Monday, staff and city employees can attend counseling sessions, one-on-one or in a group, at four locations.

"We're struggling for

sure," Officer Ron Danison, president of the El Monte Police Officers Association, said. The union has about 100 members from sergeants on down.

"I would say the only thing keeping me going personally is I'm busy," he said.

Paredes' locker is right next to his locker, which is a constant reminder, Danison said. There is an American flag draped over Paredes' locker, he said.

He knows officers have come in for a group session. There is a stigma about law enforcement reaching out for help, he said. His colleagues are breaking that perception, he said.

He pointed out that the last time an El Monte officer was fatally gunned down was in 1974.

Officer Manuel Anthony Arceo, 31, was the first El Monte officer to die in the line of duty. On July 9, 1974, he went to nearby Baldwin

Park where there was an armed barricaded suspect at a pawn shop.

A man entered the shop on Ramona Boulevard, took a machete and threatened the owner. But he declined the money she offered and said he wanted guns to kill officers, according to the Officer Down Memorial Page. The man went outside and shot at officers. A ricochet round from another officer hit Arceo. Police shot and killed the armed suspect.

Nearly 48 years after Arceo died, the department lost two officers in one night.

Tuesday night, Paredes and Santana went to the Siesta Inn at 10327 Garvey Ave. on a welfare check of a woman who was possibly stabbed, authorities have said. They encountered 35-year-old Justin Flores of Whittier. There were two shootings — one inside the motel and the second in the parking lot. Flores was pro-

nounced dead there.

There is a deep bond among officers, according to Coronilla. He saw some of the officers crying when he was at the station this week.

"You feel the heartache," Coronilla said.

The El Monte Police Department Chaplaincy Corps was created in 1997 after two local pastors talked to then-Chief Wayne Clayton about a chaplain program, according to Ussery.

Their roles are listed in the city website and include: visiting sick and injured officers and department personnel at home and in hospitals, assist officers in making death notifications, provide assistance to victims and witnesses, provide services for funerals and weddings as requested, serve as part of the "Area D" Crisis Response Team and ride along with officers and help provide family domestic spiritual counseling.

the front steps of the Civic Center, 11333 Valley Blvd. in El Monte. Parking is available at the nearby courthouse.

Paredes and Santana went to the Siesta Inn on Tuesday night to check the welfare of a woman who possibly had been stabbed, according to a sheriff's statement. They encountered a woman and a man.

The woman was Flores' wife, Diana, according to Lynn Covarrubias, who is Flores' mother.

Sheriff's investigators have released few details. There was a shooting inside the motel, then the second shooting happened in the parking lot. Detectives found a gun at the scene but have not said the make or model of the weapon.

Friday afternoon, the mother of one of the vic-

tims said that Los Angeles County District Attorney George Gascón is to blame for the death of her son and his partner.

Olga Garcia, the mother of Santana, was joined by law enforcement, deputy district attorney officials and the widows of other slain officers outside the El Monte Police Department at a news conference to voice concerns over Gascón's policies, which she said led to the early release Flores, the suspected shooter.

"I blame the deaths of my son and his partner on Gascón. Gascón will never know how I feel. Gascón will never know how he destroyed our family," Garcia said Friday.

Flores was on probation at the time of the shootout. He had a previous strike on his record, court records show.

Two months after Gascón took office, Flores pleaded guilty to the charge of being a felon in possession of

a firearm in 2021. Two other charges were dropped as part of the plea deal and

Flores received two years of probation and 20 days in jail.

A statement from the district attorney's office said executive managers had re-

viewed the facts of Flores' case and found the plea deal to be on par with previous administrations.

Since Tuesday, different police agencies have been helping El Monte police by patrolling the city.

They are providing mutual aid so El Monte officers can do what they need to do and grieve, according to Bryan Ariizumi, a disaster management liaison officer. He said these services are provided to agencies when there is a police shooting.

Covina, Glendora, Baldwin Park and Irwindale police were covering the city's Friday day shift while Monrovia and West Covina police covered Friday night, Ariizumi said.

City Manager Alma K Martinez said different law enforcement agencies had also offered food, moral support and therapy dogs.

City Hall will be closed Monday for a grieving day, she said.

New townhome development in North Long Beach geared towards multigenerational families

Vice Mayor Rex Richardson and developers celebrated the groundbreaking of a new townhome development in North Long Beach on Thursday, June 9.

Nestled between a furniture store and a carpet store on Artesia Boulevard, the lot has been vacant for nearly two decades after a fire destroyed the original building.

Going in it's place will be a townhouse development from Urban Pacific Group that will contain five units intended for multigenerational families—each with five bedrooms and five bathrooms. One unit will be deed-restricted for low-income housing.

The townhome project is the third groundbreaking that Urban Pacific has undertaken in the past year.

“Now what you see with this incredible townhouse project, you’re gonna see modern architecture that’s gonna improve the standard

of architecture here on [the] Artesia Boulevard corridor,” Richardson said.

This is the first development of its kind in North Long Beach as

part of the UPLAN Zoning Initiative—otherwise known as the North Long Beach Uptown Plan—aimed at “making it easier to build things like housing and grocery stores and healthcare and more difficult to build thing like liquor stores and nuisance motels,” Richardson said.

The new units have a modernized mediterranean style of design, and Richardson hopes that adding denser housing options on Artesia Boulevard will stimulate some of the local businesses on the street.

“The project is a contemporary design,” said Scott Choppin, founder and CEO of Urban Pacific Group. “It’ll be really, I think, a fresh and outstanding new addition to the Artesia Boulevard corridor.”


Just a few blocks away from the development is the popular Uptown Commons complex that opened in 2020.

“We look forward to welcoming new residents to North Long Beach community when this project is done,” Richardson said.

The townhouses are expected to begin receiving residents by next summer.

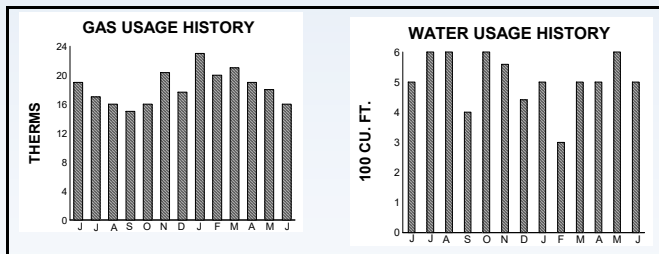
